<p>Man-made (human) features – made or caused by human beings e.g. cities, roads, bridges</p> <p>Natural (physical) features – part of land not made by people e.g. plants, soil, sea</p> <p>Ocean – a very large area of sea</p> <p>Pebbles – small smooth round stones found by the edge of the sea</p> <p>Pier - a platform on pillars projecting from the shore into the sea, typically incorporating entertainment arcades and places to eat</p> <p>Promenade - a paved public walk, typically one along the seafront at a resort</p> <p>Rock pool - a pool of water among rocks, typically along a shoreline</p> <p>Port – a harbour where ships load and unload</p> <p>Sea – a large body of salt water that is mostly surrounded by land</p> <p>Seaside – a place by the sea, especially a beach area or a holiday resort</p> <p>Shore – the end along the edge of a sea or lake</p> <p>Tourist – a person that is travelling or visiting a place for pleasure</p> <p>Town - a built-up area with a name, defined boundaries, and local government, that is larger than a village and generally smaller than a city</p> <p>Village - a group of houses smaller than a town and situated in a rural area</p>			<p>Key facts</p> <p>Around three quarters of the earth surface is covered by oceans.</p> <p>The largest ocean on earth is the Pacific Ocean – it covers around one third of the earth</p> <p>Beaches are landforms along the shoreline of water bodies such as an ocean, sea, lake or river. They are made up of loose rock particles of materials such as sand, gravel, shingle, pebbles, cobblestones or shells.</p> <p>Beaches can come in many different colours: white, grey, gold-yellow, brown, red, black</p> <p>Beaches became popular as tourist attractions during the 18th century</p> <p>The longest beach in the world is in Brazil – it is 132miles long (same distance as from Luton to Manchester)</p> <p>Popular seaside resorts in Britain: Margate, Brighton, Bournemouth, Whitby, Woolacombe, Salcombe, St Ives, Torquay, Skegness, Tenby</p> <p>Great Britain is an island but the whole country of the United Kingdom includes also the north eastern part of the island of Ireland and many more smaller islands such as: Isle of Wight, Isle of Man, Isles of Scilly, Skye, Hebrides, Mull, Aran, Shetland, Orkney</p>
