| <p><u>'We are detectives'</u></p> <p>This half term, you have a challenge! A challenge to solve a mystery by reading, sending and replying to emails, and by listening to a witness's account. You will use a fact file sheet to create a table and identify the culprit (a person who is responsible for a crime).</p> <p>This unit will enable you to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • understand that email can be used to communicate • develop skills in opening, composing (writing) and sending emails • gain skills in opening and listening to audio files on the computer • use appropriate language in emails • develop skills in editing and formatting (editing) text in emails • be aware of e-safety issues when using email. <p>(information from 'Rising Stars Computing')</p> <p>By the end of term, you will know and understand that a detective is a person who solves crime, investigates and spies for living. They work for police or are hired by a private person or company. A detective that is hired by a person or company is called a private investigator.
