Artsmark

We are very proud to announce that we have been awarded Artsmark Silver Award. Artsmark is awarded by Arts Council England, with the aim to help unlock the potential of children and young people, help to develop character and talent, and increase their knowledge and understanding. This is a snippet from the feedback from the assessors who awarded us our Artsmark Silver Award:

'You have successfully developed the use of the arts to support learning, notably in the use of poetry-writing workshops, in collaboration with a NYGT spoken word artist and the UK Centre for Carnival Art. You have seen improvements in literacy and there is a strong momentum to develop oracy through the use of drama processes as you move forward. For your topic of Ancient Greece, you made Greek theatre masks and staff are now enthusiastic to take this forward into a Greek drama performance. CPD in art has improved staff knowledge and confidence, and training in Dance has even seen spontaneous break time dance activities arising. This enthusiasm from staff and pupils is very valuable. The children in your Take One Picture art club relished seeing their work in a National Gallery exhibition. Experiences such as this, or singing at Luton Airport, Singing Spectacular show or dancing at the AW Dance academy show can be transformative, and it will be wonderful to embed such opportunities for all children within your range of offer. You have used the arts to reflect and celebrate diversity in, for instance, your art-based project in Black History Month.

Firework Safety

Fireworks are exciting, but they can be very dangerous and can hurt you. Listen to your grown-up about where is a safe place to stand and follow this advice:

- Never touch a firework. Don't pick up a firework after it has been used.
- · Wear your gloves when you hold your sparkler and keep it away from your body.
- It's not a good idea to hold more than one sparkler at once.
- Keep your sparkly sparkler safely away from other people and don't run around with it.
- Don't throw your sparkler in case it hits someone.
- Once your sparkler is finished, put it into a bucket of water, don't pick it back up. It stays hot for a long time
 and can burn you.
- Leave your dressing up clothes at home on fireworks night, wrap up warm instead.
- Stand well away from the bonfire and stay close to the grown-ups.
- Don't be tempted to throw things into the bonfire or poke at it with sticks.
- If you're going to a firework display, hold hands with your grown-up and stay with them all the time.
