The DfE Vision for the Primary PE and Sport Premium

ALL pupils leaving primary school physically literate and with the knowledge, skills and motivation necessary to equip them for a healthy, active lifestyle and lifelong participation in physical activity and sport.

- build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

- 2. Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity

- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and physical activities offered to all pupils
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport

It is a statutory requirement of Ofsted, under their Common Inspection Framework, to ensure that information on the use of the Primary PE and Sport Premium and the impact it has had on pupils PE and sport participation and attainment is available on the school website by **31st July 2024**. Schools also have a responsibility to publish on their website the % of children who achieve the expectation for swimming by the end of Year 6.

PE and Sport Premium Action Plan

Summary of key achievements from 2022 -2023	Key Impact from 2022-2023
The resurfacing the school field with both new top soil and seed.	 During summer term, all planned PE lessons were able to take place on the field, with all possible sequences delivered (22/22). Prior to this 15/22 summer sports were impacted (due to risk assessments) with the field either being too hard / too many holes. An extended sports day was able to take place in the summer term which included a 'long run' and all year groups' sprints at expected distances. Previously the year 5 and 6 sprints had to be shorted due to the hardness and holes of the field. We will now be able to hold home fixtures in football, cricket and rounders in 2023-2024, where we have otherwise been unable to do. This will hopefully encourage parental support.
After school clubs have been running all year. A range of boys and girls have attended each. Examples of the clubs are: cricket, athletics, football, handball, American football and multi-sports.	 192 children were offered clubs in Autumn, 201 children in Spring and 319 children in the summer term. All clubs were between 30-60 minutes long which has increased the engagement of all children beyond the school day. Every child in all terms who requested an after-school club was given a place. All of this at no cost to the parent.
Equipment has been purchased and we have seen an increased participation in physical activity during break times.	 New equipment has been purchased which has allowed more children to be active during break and lunch times (exact items are available to be seen on request) 38 TAs have received training on renewed expectations and activities which can be led with children at lunchtimes. Further training will be given in the Autumn Term of 2023 to extended provision and to train new staff members.

	• Following the training and the purchasing of equipment, there was a significant increase in adult-led activities. On the last 3 weeks of the summer term – at least 3 adult-led activities were led on every single occasion. Prior to this, there was regularly
